Simulation: Immigration in the United States	

Immigration has always been a contentious issue in the United States. Today it is a particularly charged issue, and Congress is struggling to make laws that will deal with it appropriately. In this simulation you will try to come up with an immigration policy that works. The purpose of the discussion, however, is not to win an argument. The purpose is to figure out how to negotiate an end result that meets both parties' needs.

<b>The Question:</b> What should be the U.S. policy on immigration?				
<i>Check your facts.</i> As a group, go to the websites supplied and research some of the facts on your argument sheet. Both parties often use the same facts in different ways. Look at your own facts critically.				
Write down two facts that are either slightly deceptive, double sided, or vague:				
For example: Immigration made sense when we were an empty continent, not now when the ecological carrying capacity of the U.S. is being stretched to its limit. <sup>1</sup>				
The phrase "an empty continent" is misleading because 500 nations of Native Americans				
already lived here. They would probably not say that our immigration policy then "made				
sense." We also happen to be the greatest waste-producing nation in the world. Our				
ecological carrying capacity is a relative concept, depending upon lifestyles, habits, and choices.

Negotiation Guide		
After examining the facts used in your side of the argument, look at the facts both sides use from a different perspective. What <b>interests</b> drive the use of these facts?		
ex. Immigration from 1925 to 1965 averaged 178,000 per year. Now, we're taking in		
approximately 1.1 million legal immigrants and up to 700,000 illegal aliens annually.		
We want to limit skyrocketing US population.

## **Arguments:**

- Under current policy, U.S. population will double this century practically within the lifetimes of today's children and will continue to grow.
- In 1995, only 5% of legal immigrants were skilled workers.

A new report by the <u>Center for Immigration Studies</u> concludes that over 33 million legal immigrants and illegal aliens now live in the United States, an increase of 2 million immigrants since the recent April 2000 Census.

- The <u>Population Reference Bureau</u> projects the U.S. will add 140 million people to it population between 2002 and 2050, thus increasing the population of the U.S from 287 million to 420 million.<sup>8</sup>
- As for legal status, we estimate that the birth rate of illegal alien women was 3.1 children on average in 2002, or about 50 percent higher than the two children natives have on average. The birth rate for legal immigrants is 2.6, or about one-third higher than that of natives.<sup>9</sup>
- We have previously estimated from birth records that there were 380,000 births to illegal aliens in 2002, accounting for nearly 10 percent of all births in the United States.<sup>10</sup>
- New immigrants (legal and illegal) plus births to immigrants add some 2.3 million people to the United States each year, accounting for most of the nation's population increase.<sup>11</sup>
- Colorado spends \$50 million per year educating immigrant children from Mexico alone. This will require 5,000 new teachers to be hired annually and building 20 new schools annually. The Rocky Mountain News reported construction and renovation would cost \$165-175 million.<sup>12</sup>
- Approximately 52% of immigrant families earn less than two times the official poverty level. Nearly 20% of immigrant-headed households in Colorado receive some form of welfare benefit.
- The National Academy of Sciences found the net fiscal drain on American taxpayers is \$166-226 per year for each native household. Even studies showing modest economic gain from immigration (\$1-10 billion per year) find it is outweighed by the fiscal cost of \$15-20 billion per year. <sup>13</sup>
- •1,880,000 American workers are displaced from their jobs by immigration. The cost for providing welfare and assistance to displaced Americans is over \$15 billion/year. 14
